Students in high-risk populations will be served through on-site learning models or distance learning when needed. We have an additional support person to assist students and families with who is also the Title I Reading Support Teacher. Students in high-risk populations will have medical information documented on site. Health Aides will discuss all protocols with parents prior to limited in-person or online learning. Support will be provided to high-risk populations by an interdisciplinary team of classroom (cohort) teachers and support teachers. We currently have a Title I Reading Support Teacher that is our support teacher for lower grades students in high-risk populations. We have an upper grades teacher that is our support teacher for upper grades students in high-risk populations.</p> <p>2. Parents/Guardians will be given the opportunity to indicate whether or not their child has a health condition that requires additional nursing services.</p> <p>3. - Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week. Schools must plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure. Cohorts may change week-to-week, but must be stable within the educational week.
- Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces (e.g., desks, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.

For students with existing medical conditions and a physician’s orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts **must not** deny any in-person instruction.
